

Although Jovce has been unable to worship at Grace for many years, many members remember her ready smile, her energy, her dedication, and her giftedness. She was a moving force in developing and launching a daycare center at Grace during the nineties. And she was honored to be one of the first females to be elected in West Michigan as a deacon in the Christian Reformed Church. She served in countless other ways in the life of the congregation, including singing in

the gospel choir and working on neighborhood projects.

For thirty years Joyce worked professionally as a case worker for the Michigan Department of Social Services. She had a true heart for people who faced dire situations and was always ready to go the extra mile for them. That compassion and energy translated well to her work at Grace—where as a deacon and advocate for children, she also encountered people with true need.

Joyce was raised Swedish Lutheran but was drawn to the warmth and acceptance of the Grace congregation, which she joined officially in 1988. She has continued to value greatly the visits, cards, and prayers of Grace members during recent years when she was confined to her room at Luther Village. And she found great peace in knowing that that same community was there to support her daughter Cathy

Anyone who talked to Joyce in recent months heard stories about the children and grandchildren that she loved so much. And they also heard her calm assurance that she would soon meet her Lord. Ruth VanderHart

On Sunday, May 31, Grace Church honored Harry as he retires from campus ministry with students on the downtown campuses of Community College, Davenport, and Kendall. But capturing the depth of his commitment and the scope of his ministry takes more than a luncheon or a few paragraphs in Grace Notes. Here are some of the significant ways in which Harry reaches out and interacts with students who are searching for community and a safe place to ask faith questions on campus. During a typical week Harry. . .

- leads several Bible studies,
- meets with student leaders to develop their ministry skills.
- invites lecturers to campus to address challenging issues.

- offers discussion groups around special interests,
- creates opportunities for fellowship and outreach (like movie and pizza nights),
- mentors individual students as they make career choices in the light of their faith.

When asked, Harry will tell you that one of the most gratifying parts of his ministry has been simply helping students make it through school. Because many of the students he comes along side of are "first generation" college students, they lack the models and encouragement that are taken for granted in



families for whom college education is a given. Add to that Harry's commitment to helping young adults live out their faith through their career choices and life decisions and you have a glimpse of the legacy he leaves to his successors in Campus Ministry leadership.




Nathan Van Harn graduated from Grand Rapids Christian Middle School and will attend Grand Rapids Christian High in the fall.


